our homeownership program

Margaret Kyazze and her family are our latest mortgage-free homeowners as of the summer of 2016. With a lot of hard work and determination, it took the single mother of two only 14 years to pay off her interest-free Habitat mortgage for her home on D'Aoust Avenue in Ottawa South. This is the ultimate success for Habitat GO. We believe that families like the Kyazzes can build strength, security and self-reliance through affordable homeownership.

We make this possible for our future homeowners by:

- Building homes using volunteer labour and donated materials
- Selling these homes to partner families with a required commitment of 500 volunteer hours
- Offering families an affordable and sustainable no-interest, no down-payment mortgage

- Setting the families' monthly mortgage payments at 25% of their gross income (this includes principal repayment and property tax)

Habitat homes help families avoid making impossible choices between rent and other basic necessities by providing them with a mortgage they can afford. An affordable mortgage allows our homeowners to ensure their needs are met – including childcare, transportation, groceries, education, school supplies, medical and dental expenses, clothing, furniture, and more.

Partner families' monthly mortgage payments go into a revolving fund called the “Fund for Humanity.” This fund is reinvested into the community and used to build more homes for families in need of a hand up.

BUILDERS CLUB

The Builders Club is our monthly donors club. By joining the Builders Club, you will provide Habitat GO with much-needed steady, reliable funding. Depending on your giving levels, you may be eligible for discounts on ReStore purchases, tickets to our annual Gala and more.

GIFTS OF CASH

We rely on your donations to fulfill our mission. Cash donations of \$20 or more will be given a tax-deductible receipt. Donations can be made by cheque, cash, credit card, pre-authorized payments through your bank account or donating online from our website, by phone or via mail. You can also make a gift in honour of a loved one or to celebrate a special occasion.



CORPORATE GIFTS & SPONSORSHIP

Companies can offer Habitat GO support through sponsorships and donations. We can offer your company a unique spectrum of marketing opportunities and a chance to make a difference in the community. Options for corporate involvement range greatly from builds, Adopt-a-Day team building and special events.

GIFTS-IN-KIND

We accept in-kind gifts of supplies and materials for our many builds, our two ReStores and our special events.



PLANNED GIVING

You will create a legacy when you remember Habitat GO in your will or through your life insurance provider. As a “Legacy Builder,” you will know that you are helping to create an enduring legacy of hope by choosing to leave a bequest.

DONATE LAND

Finding affordable land to build on is one of our biggest obstacles and is crucial to our success. Donated land is always preferable; however, we will consider paying part cash and part tax receipt or purchasing land at below market value.

GIFTS OF SECURITIES

Publicly traded securities (shares, bonds, mutual funds) can be donated as an alternative to cash. These gifts are exempt from any capital gains tax with the tax receipt reflecting the full market value of the gift on the day of transfer.

Completion of Cousineau Street Build

In August 2016, Habitat GO celebrated the completion of its build of four homes on Cousineau Street in Orléans. The project is located on one of the area's original streets and the homes were specially designed to create a small community with communal parking and green space.

The homes were purchased by the Ashigo/Tumbeo family, the Boakye family, the Slota/Bildwin family and the Sougueh/Mohamed family. Roslyn Bern of the Leacross Foundation officially handed over the house keys to each of our new homeowners. The Leacross Foundation was not only the Platinum Hammer sponsor for our Women Build program, but will be returning as the Development Sponsor of our largest development to date – a 16-unit townhouse project in Orléans.

Habitat GO is grateful for the dedication, generosity and ingenuity of so many people who were involved with this project, including Steve Walsh, our Construction Manager, our amazing Crew Lead and Site Liaison volunteers, and all of our donors, sponsors, suppliers and tradespeople.





Algonquin College Partnership in Perth and New Perth Chapter

Habitat GO launched an exciting new partnership with the Construction Carpentry – Advanced Construction program at Algonquin College's Perth campus in 2016. A single-family home that features a unique, net zero energy design is being built by the students as part of their curriculum for the 2016-2017 school year. The build site, which is located on Arthur Street across from the Perth Fairgrounds, is a piece of property originally purchased by the college from the Town of Perth.

Habitat GO has a long history of partnering with Algonquin College, most recently with the Blitz Build in 2014.

"Our campus and Habitat for Humanity felt that an opportunity for a Perth Chapter also existed," said Chris Hahn, Dean of the Perth Campus. "Our Construction Carpentry – Advanced Housing students complete a build every

year in the second year of the program."

Habitat GO also started a local Perth Chapter made up of local volunteers as part of this new partnership. Led by Chair Allan Brown, the Chapter members are helping with fundraising, finding gift-in-kind labour and materials, marketing and raising awareness in the community.

Chris added that the collaboration is "a natural fit and it makes sense to build a home for a family in need and partner with such a high quality and principled institution as Habitat for Humanity whose values align with our own – the college's values are caring, learning, integrity and respect. We take our role seriously as being a part of our community. This project meets all those aspects."

The home will be completed in the spring of 2017 and it will be purchased by the Tall family (pictured bottom left).

Carleton Place Build

In partnership with our Carleton Place Chapter, Habitat GO kicked off construction of our third build in Carleton Place in October 2016. The single-family home is located on Crampton Drive and was completed in the spring of 2017. The home was purchased by the Michaelis family.

The Groundbreaking Ceremony took place in August 2016 and we were pleased to have many of our Carleton Place Chapter volunteers join us, as well as Carleton Place Mayor Louis Antonakos and Town Councillor Sean Redmond. Special thanks to Waterside – A V!VA Retirement Community in Carleton Place for their generosity and community spirit. They gave us permission to use a portion of their adjoining parking lot for our build trailer, storage and much-needed volunteer parking.



Carleton Place Chapter

In 2016, the members of Habitat GO's new Carleton Place Chapter worked hard to help make our build a success. This was our first build in the area since 2013.

Chapters are made up of a group of passionate, engaged volunteers committed to Habitat for Humanity's goal of helping families in need of affordable housing.

The Carleton Place Chapter, led by Chair Peter Wright, helped with fundraising for the build, construction and supporting the Michaelis family on their journey towards homeownership.



Meet the Michaelis Family: Our Carleton Place Future Homeowners

Shane and Laura Michaelis have been dreaming about becoming homeowners for years. The couple are parents to five children – Tamara, 12, Zachary, 11, Holly-Rose, 8, Kylie, 7, and Sydney, 3.

They were renting a cramped, older home in Carleton Place that didn't suit their needs. The older windows and electric heating also meant that the couple struggled to pay their high energy bills each month.

Shane works full-time at Costco in Ottawa's west-end and Laura is a busy stay-at-home mom who volunteers at the children's schools. As a Habitat GO Partner Family, they are looking forward to improving their family's quality of life.

"We want to provide a safe and happy environment for our children where we can offer them a future that includes better lives and less of a struggle," says Shane.

Thanks to the commitment of Habitat GO's sponsors, donors, volunteers, tradespeople and the members of our new Carleton Place Chapter, the family's dream of homeownership came true in early 2017 when they purchased the single-family home on Crampton Drive.

Habitat for Humanity runs a social enterprise called the ReStore, a retail operation that helps us fund the organization's operations. The Greater Ottawa ReStores accept donations of quality new and gently used home, building and renovation supplies from individuals, homeowners, businesses and organizations and sells them back to the public at deeply discounted rates. Plus you never pay HST!

New inventory is always arriving from a variety of generous supporters, so every trip to our Greater Ottawa ReStores offers a unique opportunity to discover a fantastic deal, a one-of-a-kind item, or the missing piece in your design inspiration. Shopping at the ReStores is also an environmentally conscious decision as much of the product sold would otherwise end up in a landfill.

SERVING THE COMMUNITY

There are two ReStores in Ottawa – ReStore East, located at 768 Belfast Rd., behind the Trainyards, and ReStore West, located at 7 Enterprise Ave., near the intersection of Hunt Club and Merivale.

HELPING THE ENVIRONMENT

The Greater Ottawa ReStores divert more than 1.7 million pounds of waste from our local landfills each year. The ReStores recycle all cardboard and unusable metal that come in on otherwise good resaleable product.

In 2016, the ReStores' electronic waste (e-waste) recycling campaign and the scrap metal campaign raised a total of \$42,420.

INDISPENSABLE VOLUNTEERS

Along with our full- and part-time employees, we depend on our amazing volunteers at both ReStores. In 2016, our volunteers committed 4,301 hours to testing, fixing, cleaning and delivering donations. ReStore staff and volunteers also processed more than 8,000 donations in 2016.

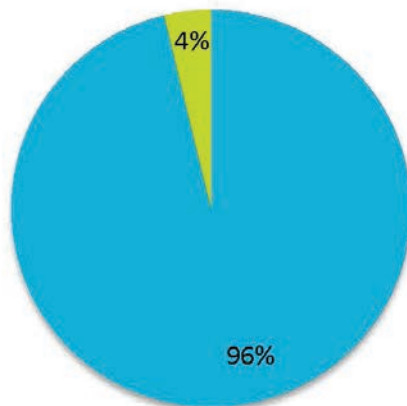

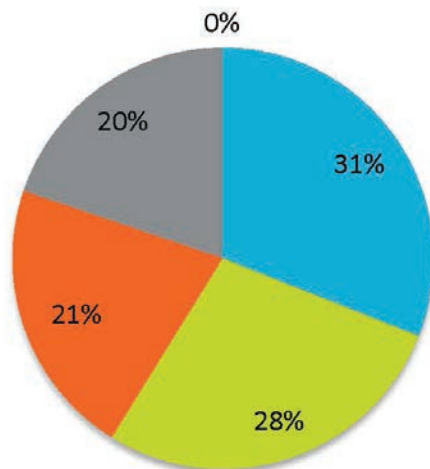
