



what we do

With the help of volunteers and Habitat homeowners, Habitat for Humanity builds safe, decent and affordable homes, including single-family and multi-unit houses. Habitat has been building homes in Ottawa since 1993, and has served 73 local families over the last 25 years.

why affordable homeownership?

Every Habitat house changes lives: those of the families who help build them and pay an affordable mortgage and all those in the community who offer them a hand up through donations, volunteering and support.

We know that safe, decent and affordable homeownership plays a critical role in helping families build a foundation for a life with better choices and more opportunities. With a little help, Habitat homeowners are able to achieve the strength, stability and independence they need to build better lives for themselves and their families. They are empowered to overcome the barriers that stand between their families and better, healthier, more financially stable lives. The outcomes are long-lasting and life-changing.


A 2015 study conducted by the Boston Consulting Group shows that there are significant and quantifiable benefits to society as a result of Habitat families having access to affordable homeownership. On average, Habitat generates \$175,000 of benefits to society per home. These benefits come in the form of reduced reliance on social housing and food banks, better educational and employment outcomes and improved health. In Canada, Habitat's affordable homeownership program has created a social return on investment of over \$633 million since 1985.

welcome to Leacross Landing

In June of 2018, the first four families in our Leacross Landing development received the keys to their new homes. We also celebrated the ground breaking of Phase II, and look forward to its completion in the spring of 2019.

meet Annie

The single mom is originally from Pangnirtung, Nunavut, a small community of 1,400 people located on the coast of a mountainous fjord on Baffin Island. Annie moved to Ottawa after high school to pursue her secondary education at Nunavut Sivuniksavut. "As a mother, owning a Habitat home is really a life changer for me and my son. We are going to build our life in a safe, comfortable, healthy home. The home will give us a sense of belonging and security and I am very thankful for that. The Habitat Greater Ottawa community really is a community. It is a community of passionate individuals that work together to create better lives for others. I feel so fortunate that I got to meet so many wonderful people throughout this entire process."





meet Abdellatif and Saadia

Abdellatif and Saadia moved from Morocco to Ottawa in 2009. Abdellatif worked as a farm adviser with the Department of Moroccan Agriculture for 14 years, but he decided to pursue a new career in the healthcare industry when he arrived in Canada. "We want to ensure a better environment that is healthy and safe for our children," said Abdellatif. "This is only possible thanks to Habitat and to all those who are helping make this dream a reality."

Tereza had been dreaming about becoming a homeowner for years. The single parent, who works full-time as an early childhood educator, is devoted to creating a better future for her three children. "Being a single mother is not easy, but finally all of my hard work has paid off. 
meet Innocent and Adeline


RenoMark Reno Tour




